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

ask the preacher

This question came from a reader in England.

"I am a Christian. I have been baptized, but I am still swearing. I want to stop, but I'm finding it hard to do. Also, I wondered if I stopped, should I be baptized again or is it wrong in God's eyes?"

You say you are a Christian, but may I ask you if you have been saved or born again? Being baptized is the right thing to do after you have been saved. (Acts 2:41 "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized...") Once you are saved, the Holy Spirit comes to live in your heart. When you do wrong, you feel a prick in your heart. It is the conviction of the Holy Spirit.

That is how God tells us that we are doing something that He is not happy about.

Jesus said in John 16:7-13, "Nevertheless I tell you the truth; It is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you; but if I depart, I will send him unto you. And when he is come, he will reprove the world of sin.....Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth is come, he will guide you into all truth..."

Wanting to stop swearing is the right thing to do, but baptism has nothing to do with it. Baptism is an act of obedience to what God commands after we are saved. You are baptized once just like you get saved once. When we sin, we have to confess our



sin to God (I John 1:9 "If we confess our sin, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins...), but we don't get saved again nor do we have to be baptized again.

The question is, "How do I stop swearing?"

First of all, you must realize that swearing is wrong. It is sin. If the Holy Spirit lives inside of you, He will make you feel bad every time you say swear words. If you love the Lord, you won't want to displease Him. I Timothy 4:12 also reminds us that we are to be an example of the believers in word and conversation. Swearing should not come out of a Christian's mouth. Taking the name of

the Lord in vain is in direct disobedience to God's Word.

Secondly, are you around people that swear a lot? Perhaps you swear to be like them. Then you need to try to tell your friends why you feel you shouldn't swear, and maybe they will see they need to be saved, too. If they don't see it that way, maybe you need to find some new friends. Friends that swear will also try to get you to do other things that you should not do.

Do you have a parent or a pastor that could pray with you about this? Having someone to be accountable to will also help you to be careful what you say. • the end



You've heard people say, "I know my heart." No, you don't! "The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked. Who can know it?" "You must be careful about getting your heart involved in things. Once your heart is there, you are





there. God himself couldn't talk you out of it.

he Bible tells us that there are many things we ought to keep or to guard. Let's look first of all at Philippians 4:8. "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."

One thing you ought to guard is your mind. The mind is a terrible thing to waste. I know you think you don't have a brain, but

you do. It might be the size of a BB, but it's there. Have you ever had something come to your mind and you thought, why did I think of that? Once it's in there, it's there. The mind is an unbelievable computer. You ought to guard it. Drugs are a no-brainer. Come on, you are really going to smoke that? You're an idiot! You're gonna snort that? You won't be able to spell your name backwards even if it is Bob. You'll be wasted!

What I'm talking about is once you let things into your mind, once you start playing games with your mind and thinking

about things you shouldn't, you are in trouble. If you think about something long enough, you're going to do it.

ot long ago, I was preaching a revival meeting in a prison. A man tapped me on the shoulder and called me by name. I hadn't seen him since the fifth grade. Who remembers fifth grade? Uh, I went three times, but I still don't remember it. He said to me, "We went to the same Christian school, we heard the same preaching." He said all he was doing was driving a car. He was waiting outside, but he was as guilty as they were. He said,



"They kept telling me to think of all the money I'd get. I thought about it too long. They talked me into it. I thought about it too long, and I did it." What a waste of time to spend your days in prison? Young men that don't guard their minds do things they wished they hadn't. The Bible says, "Think on things that are honest and of good report."

We should also guard our eyes. Psalms 101:3, "I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes." You may not be able to control all the things you see. As you walk around or drive around, sometimes things

just jump out at you. "I will set no wicked thing before mine eyes." That TV is set before you. The verse not only said I will set no wicked thing before me, it also said I will hate the work of those that turn aside. I've known friends in the same youth group, both with good parents, but because they chose wicked things to set before themselves and they did not guard their eyes, they were friends with the world and enemies of God. You're not going to yoke up with both of them. You'd better be careful about what you set before your eyes. They are not just good people going

the wrong way. They are wicked and taking a whole lot of people with them. Hate the work of those that turn aside.

I've seen good kids that were at youth conferences last year that are not there this year. What happened? It's a phenomenal thing. How could they get turned aside? The eye gate is what fills the mind. You had better be careful what you look at. We'd better guard our mind and guard our eyes.

Tim.4:12. "Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity."







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

Ritardando is a musical term that is usually abbreviated as rit. While explaining the definition to a student recently, the root word, "retard," became the focus of attention for a few minutes. I'm not talking about the noun "retard" which some sister uses as a slang word for her brother. You know, kinda slow

Many times in the Bible we are told to slow down as in waiting (Isaiah 40:31), to wait patiently (Ps. 37:7, 40:1), and to "be still and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10). There are rewards for those that wait on the Lord—they shall renew their strength. To those that wait patiently, He inclines His ear. To those that be still, we have the promise of knowing that He is God.

sometimes? I'm talking about the verb "retard" which refers to

The word "still" means "to slacken, be faint, wax feeble, be weak, abate, to cease." Other definitions are:

slacken: to become less energetic, not under any tension.

abate: to reduce, to do away with, to grow less.

feeble: lacking in energy or strength, weak, unclear, lacking in

effectiveness.



slowing down.

So in other words... Be weak and know that I am God, or Be strengthless and know that I am God. So here the Lord is saying it is ok to be weak. Why? Because 2 Cor.12:9 says "My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me."

Jesus wants his bride to be WEAK!!! Why? So that His power, His capabilities, can shine through us, and He gets ALL the glory!!
